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Spreading infection due to touch, sneezes and coughs		Handwashing and sanitising facilities will be provided.
		Students and staff can wear face coverings in school, but this is not mandatory and is down to personal choice.
		Everyone in school will:
		 Wash their hands with soap and water for 20 seconds and dry thoroughly using <u>NHS guidelines</u>, or use alcohol- based hand sanitiser to cover all parts of their hands-on arrival at school.

Fire, first aid and emergency procedures will be reviewed to make sure they can still be followed with changes to how the school space is being used.
		In the event of having to evacuate the building, the member of staff will instruct students to leave the room safely, maintaining social distancing where practicable. Corridor fire doors fitted with mechanical closure devices will be open. These doors will be closed automatically on the activation of the fire alarm. Fire doors must be closed by members of staff when leaving a room in the school – signage will be on each door to emphasise this point.
		Staff will promote good ventilation in all classrooms by opening windows, with a minimum of 5 minutes in a 15- minute period. Staff will open all windows when the room is vacant. Windows will be closed at the end of the day for security. Students have been instructed to wear jumpers or coats if they are cold.
		Fans can be used in classrooms to aid ventilation but must only be used to circulate fresh air, windows must remain open when using a fan.

coming into school		All clinically extremely vulnerable (CEV) children and young people should attend school unless they are one of the very small number of children and young people under paediatric or other specialist care who have been advised by their clinician or other specialist not to attend. We will ensure we liaise with parents and carers where this is the case.
Control of asymptomatic staff		Staff will be provided with home testing kits and will be advised to be completed twice a week, 3 to 4 days apart. This will be reviewed by the DHSC at the end of September 2021. Participating staff are encouraged to complete self-registration and notify the NHS track and trace service of their result whether its negative, positive, or void. They will also inform school through track@sbeschool.org.uk immediately if they receive a positive test LFD and/or PCR test. They will be advised to seek a PCR test within 2 days of the positive LFD test and must isolate for 10 days following the positive result or until results are known. If the test is negative, they can return to school if feeling well. Staff must not return to school if they have had diarrhoea, vomiting or high temperature in the previous 48 hours. If the PCR test is positive, they must continue to self-isolate and will be advised for close contacts to seek a PCR test.

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		Positive LFD tests – students will wait in holding area by matrons' office and parents will be contacted for collection or permission will be sought to leave the school premises. 		LFD home testing All parents have been sent the privacy notice which they must read prior to students receiving home test kits through school. All students can access home testing kits through school – each box should last 3 weeks. They will be advised to test at home every 3-4 days and inform school of any positive results using <u>covid@sbeschool.org.uk</u> as soon as possible. All parents of students taking part in home testing must register the test results on the government website. All students with a positive LFD test will be advised to seek a PCR confirmatory test. Household members do not need to self-isolate unless they are symptomatic but will also be advised to seek a PCR test. If the test is positive, we will implement the track and trace protocol and advise close contacts to seek a PCR test.
