<u>Film Studies – A level Film Studies- Eduqas</u>

Objectives – by completing this task you will have explored some key directors in film and thought analytically about the language of film. You will also choose a film that is important to you to analyse, which will help us get to know you and understand your interests. Task one encourages you to think about micro elements or how film language such as camera shots and movements create effect. Task two encourages you to consider macro elements such as meanings, genre and auteur.

1. Task One (Micro Elements)

Select an extract from a film of your choosing and write an analysis of it.

You should focus your analysis on key elements of film such as camera work, editing, sound and the look and feel of the film.

You should analyse the scene as a whole first.

Then take one screenshot from your chosen scene and analyse in detail the following:

- 1. Setting
- 2. Props
- 3. Colour
- 4. Performance (Facial expression/ body language) only if relevant
- 5. Costume.
