


# A Student and Parent Survival Guide



#### Wellbeing

GCSE exams can be stressful. If stress is not dealt with in a positive way it can lead to a lack of focus, poor revision and ultimately decreased examination performance. So use these simple stress-busters to bust your stress!



Key Note: Remember stress is a natural reaction. Every person on earth feels it. Feeling a little bit stressed is good; it means you want to do well. We now have to learn to manage our stress the get our best performance.

- Be prepared! Establish a routine: A great tool in managing stress is making sure that you are as prepared as you can be, and you can walk into the exam knowing that you have done all you can to be successful. Students can only control the controllables. They will never know the exact exam questions, but they can revise the content, do past paper questions and speak with teachers about exam technique. REVISION IS THE KEY! Students should create a revision timetable (there is a template later in the booklet) so that they can plan and follow a routine. Built into this should be revision time but also down time where they can socialise with friends and do other hobbies. Knowing when it is time to revise and when it is time to relax does have a huge impact on the quality of revision; it also reduces the stress levels of an individual.
- Exercise regularly & get enough sleep: Stress can be relieved simply by doing some exercise and getting enough sleep. All young people should be doing some exercise as part of a healthy lifestyle, but it is crucial they do around 20-30 minutes of moderate exercise at least every other day. This can be as simple as going for a bike ride or dancing at home. To get a good night's sleep avoid caffeinated drinks after lunchtime and stick to one a day if you can; switch off smartphones and laptops at least an hour before bed; and try to keep roughly the same bedtime every night this helps your body adjust to a routine, so it will be much easier to fall asleep when you want to.

- Take breaks and relax: Working hard and revising is imperative for success, but it is unproductive to sit with books open for hours on end. Students should work out what works best for them, but a useful guideline is 30-50 minutes of revision followed by a 5–10-minute break. This should be done as often as possible during the day but never over 3-4 hours at a time. This will lead to resentment towards revision. But almost more importantly it will be wasted time as the human brain cannot keep taking in knowledge without sufficient rest and fuel.
- Create a positive working environment: Choose an area to work in with minimal distractions a quiet, well-lit, relaxing space where you can focus and get work done. The school library is always available. Keep the TV off, put phones away and stay off social media! Display your revision timetable and keep all your supplies in one place.


Stress has been felt by every individual at some point in their life. It is a natural response. So don't stress about feeling stressed. Students need to understand why they are getting stressed and put necessary procedures in place to reduce it. For example, this might be 'not understanding a specific topic in maths'. In this case a student can:

- Speak to their maths teacher
- Speak to their form tutor
- Attend ESS sessions
- Use the revision resources recommended by the maths team
- Seek the support of a friend.

#### **Effective Revision Strategies**

#### **Curve of Forgetting**

For newly learned information



The blue line on the graph above shows why revision is so important. Science tells us that our brains are good at remembering the things that we need to know – details that are of vital importance to our survival. For example, foods we should avoid, pathways or areas we should stick to, and the people who are important in our lives. We also tend to remember experiences that trigger powerful emotions – such as surprise, fear, success, or relief – for longer. But this means that many of the things that we want to learn (or that others need us to know) can drop out of our memory all too easily.

'Learning Scientists' have researched the most effective revision strategies that will best keep information in our long-term memories. Here are some of their findings:


#### **#SBERevise100Hours**


With the Learning Scientists' research in mind, we recommend that all Year 11 students challenge themselves to log 100+ hours of revision for their mock exams in October and December (NEAs and practical exam preparation counts too), between Monday 18 September 2023 and Friday 12 January 2024. There are 119 days in total in which to complete this challenge. Year 11 have two sets of mock exams within those 119 days!

Students will be issued with a #SBERevise100Hours booklet. On the centre pages of this booklet, they should record the number of hours they revise for each day. It would be great if parents/carers would check and sign this at the end of each week. Year 11 Form Tutors will keep a check too and establish a dialogue with students about their revision.

Revision at home and at school counts. Rehearsals and preparation for practical exams and work towards NEAs in school counts too as this will all contribute to students' final GCSE grades.

Students will be introduced to this process to help them structure their revision:






**Stage 1: Gather Your Revision Resources** 

- This should only take up 10% of your revision time. Don't spend more than a week on this!
- Know when your (Mock) exams are! Students will be given Mock timetables in advance of their October and December exams.
- Know what you will be examined on Access Mock Exam Checklists in the Y11 Team on Microsoft Teams.
- Purchase Revision Guides if necessary Revision Guides will be available from the School Shop shortly.
- Find relevant class notes and any previous revision notes that you have made.
- Access subject specific revision material on Teams.
- Attend Exam Success Sessions when you are invited.
- Create a Revision timetable. Remember that the 'Learning Scientists' say revision is most
  effective when it is 'spaced' or 'interleaved'. Mix up your subjects and keep re-visiting them.









Stage 2: Filter the Information

- This should take up 30% of your revision time.
- Now you have all the revision resources for each subject, it's time to reduce the information you have gathered down to the essential parts.
- Start making notes from your class notes, revision guides, or revision videos.
- Note-making can take many forms:
  - Mindmaps
  - Flashcards
  - Dual coding
  - Mnemonics










Stage 3: Test Yourself & Learn

- This should take up 60% of your revision time. By the time of your exam this is all you should be doing.
- To learn information, you need to give your brain opportunities to retrieve it on a regular basis.
- · Retrieval practice can take many forms:
  - (Self) quizzing
  - Leitner method
  - Answering past papers





The Leitner Method (using flashcards to test yourself on a daily basis) is explained in this video.

#### **Examiner's Tips**

The job of examiners is to give you marks, not to take them away, but they are powerless to help you if you fall into the most common traps.

These are the **biggest pitfalls** they have identified:

- ✓ Not reading the paper correctly Examiners say that this is one of the most regular and serious errors. They call it the 'triggered answer'. You have your pre-prepared answer ready, but you don't look at the exact terms of the question and therefore supply the wrong information in your answer.
- ✓ Not finishing the paper Mismanaging your time within the exam can easily cost you a full grade. The biggest exam 'crime' is to leave suitable questions blank. Remember: it is much easier to get the first 20% of the marks for any question than the last 5%. Therefore, if you find yourself stuck for time as you struggle through your third answer out of five, do not spend your remaining time extending and perfecting that answer. Instead, move on to questions four and five, even if your attempt is sketched or in point form. If you have answered only three questions instead of five, the highest mark you can get is 60%.
- ✓ **Ignoring the marking scheme** You must take the number of marks available into account when you allocate time to each question or part of a question. If the marks allotted to a question clearly indicate that a few paragraphs are sufficient, do not write an essay on the subject. Avoid the temptation of writing everything you know about a topic just give the appropriate amount of information.
- ✓ Repetition Make the point once. There are no extra marks for restating facts, even if you phrase them differently. Examiners say repetition is a very common mistake. It is also a timewaster and an irritant.
- ✓ Missing part of a question Sometimes, part of a question can be carried onto the next page, and, in the pressure of the moment, you don't see it. Consequently, you might fail to do a compulsory part of a question or miss out on the chance to take an option that would have suited you better. Always take time to familiarise yourself with the whole paper before you start answering it.
- ✓ Rough work Include your rough work with your exam script you might get some credit for any planning, formulae or calculations contained therein.

#### **Command Words in Examination Questions**

The command words typed in **bold** are the instructions which are most frequently used in examinations.

- Analyse means to show the main ideas and show how they are related and why they are important.
- Comment on means to discuss, criticise or explain its meaning as completely as possible.
- Compare means to show both the similarities and the differences.
- Contrast means to compare by showing the difference.
- Criticise means to give your judgement or reasoned opinion on something, showing its good and bad points. It is not necessary to attack it.
- **Define** means to give the **formal meaning** by distinguishing it from related terms. This is often a matter of giving a memorised definition.
- Describe means to write a detailed account or verbal picture in a logical sequence or story form.
- **Diagram** means to make a **graph**, **chart**, or **drawing**. Be sure that you **label** it and add a brief explanation if it is needed.
- **Discuss** means to describe, giving the **details** and explaining the **pros** and **cons** of it.
- Enumerate means to list. Name and list the main ideas one by one and number them.
- Evaluate means to give your opinion or an expert's opinion of the truth or importance of a concept. Tell the advantages and disadvantages.
- Illustrate means to explain or make clear by concrete examples, comparisons or analogies.
- Interpret means to give the meaning using examples and personal comments to make it clear.
- **Justify** means to give a statement of **why you think it is so**. Give reasons for your statement and conclusion.
- List see Enumerate.

- Outline means to give a general summary. It should contain a series of main ideas supported by secondary ideas. Omit minor details. Show the organisation of your ideas.
- **Prove** means to show by **argument** or **logic** that it is true. (The word 'prove' has a very special meaning in mathematics and physics.)
- Relate means to show the **connections** between things telling how one **causes** or is **like** another.
- **Review** means to give a **survey** or **summary** in which you look at the important parts and **criticise** where necessary.
- State means to describe the main points in precise terms. Be formal. Use brief clear sentences. Omit details or examples.
- Summarise means to give a brief, condensed account of the main ideas. Omit details and examples.
- **Trace** means to follow the **progress** or **history** of a subject. (The word 'trace' has a special meaning in computer science.)

#### Overview:

All students are required to study GCSE English Literature and GCSE English Language. Both courses are linear and assessed by examination at the end of Year 11. There are no tiers of entry and students will sit the following exams:

EDUQAS GCSE English Language Component 1: 20th Century Literature Reading and Creative Prose

EDUQAS GCSE English Language Component 2: 19th and 21st Century Non-Fiction Reading and Transactional/Prose Writing. (60%)

AQA GCSE English Literature Paper 1: Shakespeare and the 19. Century Novel (40%)

**AQA GCSE English Literature Paper 2:** Modern Texts and Poetry (60%)

Students will also complete a non-exam assessment in spoken language (Spoken Language Endorsement). This assessment does not contribute towards the students' grades in GCSE English Language but will be separately endorsed and reported on each student's GCSE English Language certificate.

#### **Revision:**

Students need to be very well organised to succeed in these subjects. Students should allocate slots in their revision timetables to take into account both GCSE English Language and GCSE English Literature. They will have covered the course in both GCSEs and be well versed in the requirements of all four exams. Students are provided with copies of the poetry anthology required for GCSE English Literature and have access to the set texts for both English Literature exams. We recommend that they buy their own copies of the set texts to annotate; this is a valuable revision tool. Both GCSE English Literature exams are closed book. This means that students cannot take copies of the texts into the exam and will need to memorise key quotations.

**EDUQAS GCSE Music** 

#### **Assessment format:**

30% performance coursework, 30% composition coursework, 40% appraising exam time approximately 1 hour 15 minutes

## Component 1: Performing – Worth 30% of your GCSE (Marked by your teacher, moderated by Eduqas)

You must perform at least 2 pieces: One piece must be an **ensemble**, the other(s) can be ensembles or solos. You can sing or play any instrument. You can have an accompanist or use a backing track, or perform unaccompanied. Backing tracks and accompaniments must not contain the part you are playing/singing. Recordings will be scheduled in early November.

An ensemble in this course is described as a group of 2-8 live performers. You must not be performing the tune all the way through while the other performers accompany you. You must also be the only person performing your part.

Each piece must be recorded in the same school year you take the exam, and your teacher must be present.

Performing more difficult pieces – harder than Grade 3 standard – can boost your marks. You can perform easier pieces – below Grade 3 standard, but your marks will be scaled down a bit. Playing an easier piece well could result in a better mark than playing a harder piece badly!

You will need to hand in a score or a lead sheet of each piece so your teacher can assess how accurately you perform. You cannot hand in an audio/video guide track instead.

If your performances last less than 4 minutes in total, you will lose marks.

# Component 2: Composing – Worth 30% of your GCSE (Marked by your teacher, moderated by Eduqas)

You must compose two original pieces of music. Each is equally weighted. One is a free composition, which you can complete at any time in the course. The other must be written in response to a brief

released by Eduqas on the 1<sup>st</sup> September in the same school year as you take the exam. They can both be in a similar style as long as the actual musical content is different.

You will have to hand in an audio file of each piece – either a live recording (of you or someone else performing your piece) or an output from software. You will also need either a score or a lead sheet with a detailed description of each piece.

You have to complete a composing log as well which is signed by you and your teacher to authenticate your work. This explains how you completed your work, if you used any ideas which were not your own (like drum loops) and if anyone else helped you. The deadline for both pieces is February half term.

#### **Component 3: Appraising – Worth 40% of your GCSE (A listening exam.)**

In your exam there will be 8 questions. Each will have an extract of music which is played out loud for you to answer the questions on what you hear. Question 1 and question 7 will always be on the set works.

The questions will focus on three things:

**Elements of Music** – melody, harmony, tonality, form and structure, dynamics, sonority, texture, tempo, rhythm, metre.

The context – the time, place or purpose of the music

Musical Language – the list of musical terms in Appendix C of the specification, notes in the treble and bass clef and any specific vocabulary which goes with the set works.

#### Tier of entry:

GCSE Science is a tiered subject with Higher and Foundation tiers.

Higher tier = Grades 4-9. If students do not achieve a grade 4 on the higher paper they are given a U grade (fail)

Foundation tier = Grades 1-5. Students cannot achieve higher than a grade 5 on foundation tier.

Combined Science students will sit the same tier for all 6 of their papers.

Triple science students sit the same tier of paper within each discipline but can sit different tiers between disciplines. For example Foundation paper in Biology and Higher papers in Chemistry and Physics.
